May Day Parade & STA Open House May 6:

Palo Alto's annual May Day Parade on Saturday, May 6, will come down Waverley Street and end at Waverley and Homer and Heritage Park—right in front of our church.

The STA Site Committee opens the church to visitors (who can enjoy an organ concert played by Professor Bill Mahrt), serves coffee and lemonade to parade watchers, and presents a welcoming face to the many families who are standing on the sidewalk watching their children march by in the Scout troops and school bands. We keep the church restroom open—it is a welcome stop for many of the parade-watchers!

Volunteers to help with the beverages are needed—between 9:30 and noon, or any portion thereof. Because the parade

route is closed to cars early Saturday morning, aim to park south of Channing Ave. Let Kay Williams know if you can help out (see sidebar for her contact information).

PARADE ROUTE: The May Fete Parade starts at 10 a.m. – rain or shine! The parade will travel down University Avenue, turn right onto Waverley, and end at Heritage Park. Regular entries (without floats) will enter into Heritage Park. Float entries will continue onto Waverley and park between Homer and Channing. All Palo Alto bands will enter Heritage Park and proceed to the stage area where each will be introduced and play one song for the May Fete Fair.

END OF PARADE: Following the parade, stick around for

the May Fete Fair, sponsored by Palo Alto Recreation Foundation and Kiwanis Club of Palo Alto until 1pm. The Museum of American Heritage will also be having a Vintage Car Show right across the street from the park. Adults are encouraged to dress in the spirit of the parade.

Outdoor Christmas crèche scenes:

From the church steps:

Bibles for prayer assistance:

We are asking again for donations of Bibles for the book rack on the table on the left side of the church in the back. They can be donated in memory of someone or something special.

For several years, these Bibles have been used by many people who visit the sanctuary. The number of Bibles available has varied from one (noticed there recently) to as many as seven after the first round of Bibles was donated. It's better to have a few Bibles in the book rack at any one time. Then those who take one to use will understand the implied signal to return it to the rack.

The Bibles are a blessing, particularly to someone searching or going through a difficult time.

Please bring your donated Bibles to the Thomas House library, with a note telling us how to designate it—memorial, personal message, etc.

Emergency response training at St. Thomas Aquinas:

Interested parties from the 8:45 Mass community have been trained on what to do should an emergency arise during Mass (fire or earthquake, most likely), using a simple, one-page guide that is posted in the church. We would like to extend this training to the other Mass communities. This is an easy opportunity: the training requires 5 minutes after Mass under the tutelage of Ted Baer. We hope we will never have to implement the procedures, but if several regular attendees at each Mass are trained, we will be covered.

Church Interior update:

Judy Foley reports that the Interior Committee is working with committee member Jan Dedek, master cabinet maker, who is working on designs for a new altar table, ambo (from which the liturgical readings are delivered), and presider's chair. We are looking forward to seeing what comes forth from Jan's creative mind.

The front steps of the church are due for replacement. At this time, Judy is waiting to see in situ samples of the cast concrete material that is the preferred choice for re-surfacing the steps. In the meantime, we urge you to be careful on the steps—they are uneven in places.

Judy is also replacing the memorial plaques on the three benches in the Memorial Garden under the beautiful dogwood trees. The original plaques have faded over the past 15 years.
